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The Green Goals Partnership's Community Fund is available to Community Groups within the Borough of Bournemouth. Funding up to a maximum of £1000 will be available for individual projects which are community based and contribute towards:

- Improving the local environment
- Community action in green spaces
- Recycling schemes or education and awareness of waste prevention or recycling
- Engaging children and young people in environmental issues
- Engaging children and young people in healthy lifestyle activities

Funding is available throughout the 2016-17 football season (September 2016 to May 2017) and applications will be awarded according to need, priorities and impact.

Projects must commence before the end of June 2017 and spend must be completed by the end of August 2017.

The Ironmongers' Company

The Ironmongers' Company supports projects that provide opportunities for disadvantaged children and young people to fulfil their potential.

Grants are only given to registered charities. Projects must meet all of the following criteria:

- For children and young people under the age of 25 who are disadvantaged
- Consist of educational activities that develop learning, motivation and skills
- Have clear aims and objectives to be met within a planned timescale
- Are within the UK

The Company is particularly interested in enabling primary age children to develop a strong foundation for the future. Projects could, for example, support special educational needs, address behavioural problems or promote citizenship, parenting or life skills. Preference will be given to projects piloting new approaches where the outcomes will be disseminated to a wider audience.

- Grants range from a few hundred pounds up to around £10,000. The average grant awarded is £4,000.
- Grants must be spent within twelve months from the date of the award.
- Recipients are expected to submit a written evaluation report within three months from completion of the project.

The Company's support should make a recognisable difference, therefore preference will be given to requests where the grant would cover a significant element of the cost and to those from smaller organisations.

Community Business Bright Ideas Fund

The Community Business Bright Ideas Fund is inviting applications to its second round. Guidance, mentoring and grants of up to £20,000 are available to community groups in England that want to start setting up a community business.

Who can apply and for what?

Applications are open to community groups within England with ideas to set up a community business. The guidance notes give details about what constitutes a community business for the purposes of this fund.

Bright Ideas will provide successful organisations with:

- **Business development support:** Between two to 15 days of business development support from Locality, Plunkett Foundation, or Co-operatives UK.
- **Peer to peer networking:** The opportunity to learn from existing community businesses, through visits and events.
- **Grant funding:** The opportunity to apply for a grant of up to £20,000 to develop your idea and/or improve your organisation's capability, depending on your needs.

This programme is particularly designed around the needs of community groups who are exploring the potential of setting up a community business for the first time. If you are successful, you will be matched with one of the Fund's advisers. They will arrange an initial meeting with you to discuss and agree your community business development support. You must be able to start work with your adviser within one month of accepting your business development support offer.

Access to grants will depend on the stage your idea has reached. There are three bands:
Financial modelling.

The Santander Foundation

The Santander Foundation awards grants of up to £5,000 to help disadvantaged people make the most of their future.

Grants can be used to support one of our three priorities.

- **EXPLORER** Improving people's knowledge
Such as Money Management workshops helping disadvantaged people learn how to budget.
- **TRANSFORMER** Improving skills and experience
For example, training to help socially isolated people develop skills to get back into work or volunteering opportunities for disadvantaged young people.
- **CHANGEMAKER** Innovative solutions to social challenges
What about a new social networking program for visually impaired young people to access the internet?

Projects must be wholly charitable. They must specifically help disadvantaged people in the UK by improving knowledge, skills or providing innovative solutions. They aim to help as many organisations as possible so they don't offer grants for longer than one year.

Funding is available:

- for small local organisations and lasts for 12 months
- for complete projects, we don't make contributions
- to cover part-time salaries, equipment or materials but they must be specific to your project

The Kelly Family Charitable Trust

The Trust is interested in funding charities whose activities involve the whole family in initiatives that encourage and nurture a supportive structure within the family unit, and whose aims include the development of strong and supportive family bonds by helping all elements of the family unit to grow together and support each other.

The overall objective is to reinforce the potential benefit and support that family members as a unit can give to each other.

The three areas that the charity wishes to support are:

- Interventions and support that help families to manage better and prevent the fracture of the family unit, e.g. relationship counselling, mediation
- Families where sexual abuse, physical abuse, domestic violence, alcohol abuse and drugs abuse threaten the integrity of the family unit
- Prisoners and in particular their families, during and after the period of imprisonment

Grants will generally be in the range of £1000 - £5000, but Trustees will consider requests for higher amounts.

Applications must be submitted by 1st March and 1st September to be considered at the subsequent meeting.

Greggs Foundation Environmental Grant

The Environmental Grant fund is dedicated to improving the local environment - whether that means turning a piece of wasteland into a garden or organising litter picking days on the beach. They look to fund projects that improve the physical environment in a way that also benefits the wider community. Grants of up to £2,000 and concentrate on helping existing not for profit organisations to deliver new projects. Organisations may only apply once per calendar year for this grant.

Any not for profit organisation can apply, preference will be given to small, locally based and community led organisations with a turnover not in excess of £300,000 per annum. Schools are also encouraged to apply and are given the same level of priority as small locally based organisations. They are interested in projects that improve the physical environment in a way that will improve people's lives. This can include purchase of equipment, sessional salary costs, purchase of trees/plants, small capital projects and learning activities. We are also interested in new approaches and innovative ideas as well as sustainable approaches to supporting your local environment.

Round 2 opened on 7th March and closes on 24th June with decisions being announced no later than 18th August 2017. For further information [click here](#)

The Bailey Thomas Charitable Fund

The Bailey Thomas Charitable Fund is a registered charity which was established primarily to aid the research into learning disability and to aid the care and relief of those affected by learning disability by making grants to voluntary organisations working in this field.

Priorities for funding are projects for children or adults with learning disabilities (intellectual disabilities) and autism. They do not give grants for research into or care of people with mental illness, dyslexia, dyspraxia nor ADHD, if they do not also have learning disabilities (intellectual disabilities).

They consider:

- Capital building/renovation/refurbishment works for residential, nursing and respite care, and schools;
- Employment schemes including woodwork, crafts, printing and horticulture;
- Play schemes and play therapy schemes;
- Day and social activities centres including building costs and running costs;
- Support for families, including respite schemes;
- Independent living schemes;
- Support in the community schemes;
- Snoezelen rooms.
