## The Sylvia Adams Charitable Trust

The Trust is looking to support work which will improve the life chances for some of the most disadvantaged children in England and Wales by investing in early intervention and preventative work.

They are looking to support work with targeted groups of 0-3 year olds in England and Wales which will specifically:

- improve the **reach** to these targeted groups **and**
- bring about **improved defined outcomes** for these targeted groups

They are looking for proposals which:

- Have defined outcomes built in with clear measurement tools and evaluation procedures in place
- Have the flexibility to adapt to changing external factors
- Have wide application **or** which have relevance for specific groups
- Look to build on existing good practice **or** to trial new work

Successful organisations must be prepared to share learning from the funded work with other organisations, to increase the impact

### **Who can apply**

Charities registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales

### **Duration and size of grants**

Grants may be awarded for 1, 2 or 3 years.

There is no minimum grant size and the maximum will be £50,000 per annum.

The Trust is happy to consider complete or partial funding and accepts overheads as part of a budget.

### **Application dates**

Stage 1 applications from October 1st until November 30th. Decisions on these applications will be made in February 2018

## British Science Week - Kick-Start Fund for Schools

The overarching aim of the Kick-Start Fund for schools, as set by The Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy (BEIS), is to widen access to science, engineering and technology activities to schools in challenging circumstances.

There are two types of grants that applicants can apply for:

- School Activity Grant of up to £300 for schools to run a science event or activity for students
- Kick Start More Grant of up to £700 for schools to host a science event or activity that involves both students and the local community

Eligible applicants must be a UK school and either:

- Have a high proportion (over 30%) of pupils eligible for free school meals or the pupil premium
- Have a high proportion (over 30%) of pupils who are black or ethnic minority backgrounds
- Be a small school based in a remote and rural location (remote and rural schools are considered to be a settlement of less than 10,000 people with a drive time of over 30 minutes to a settlement of 10,000 or more)

Priority will be given to schools that either meet more than one of the criteria or can provide a strong case for falling well within a single criterion. The fund does not put limitations on the type of event/activities that schools can provide, this is entirely up to them.

The next deadline to apply is 13th November 2017.

## British Science Week Grants

Grants are available for community based groups and organisations in the UK to create events or activities that engage under-represented audiences as part of British Science Week (BSW).

**Maximum value:** £ 1,000

### Objectives of Fund

The Department of Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) is providing the Community Grants for Science Activity scheme to support community based groups and organisations in the UK that work directly with people who are traditionally hard-to-reach and currently not engaged in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) activity.

### Who Can Apply

Community-based groups and organisations working directly with hard-to-reach groups in the UK can apply.

Hard-to-reach groups include:

- People who are Black, Asian, Minority Ethnic (BAME).
- People with low socio economic status (SES).
- Young people facing adversity, including those not in education employment or training.
- People living in a remote and rural location.
- People living with a disability.
- Girls and women.

Examples of events and activities include, but are not limited to:

- Presentations from invited speakers on science and/or engineering topics.
- Field trips to local science centres, museums or university science departments.
- Arranging a talk or workshop with a local STEM ambassador.
- Recruiting a freelancer to deliver an arts and science activity.
- Fete, family science days, mini festivals, science fairs.
- Busking displays run in public venues, such as a supermarket, park or high street.
- Hands-on workshops.
- Debates and discussions with scientists.

# Children in Need—Small Grants

**Deadline 1st December 2017    Decision Early March**

- You can now apply for up to £10,000 per year for up to 3 years – a total request of £30,000
- They have added an eligibility checklist to the form, to help you make sure you are able to apply for our funding
- The form has been updated, so please read carefully and follow the guidance provided in the application pages
- They will still be calling many applicants to gather additional information, but this call will be shorter

They fund projects working with children and young people of 18 years and under experiencing disadvantage through:

1. Illness, distress, abuse or neglect
2. Any kind of disability
3. Behavioural or psychological difficulties
4. Living in poverty or situations of deprivation

The projects make differences in children's lives that help prevent or overcome the effects of the disadvantages they face. Projects achieve these differences by either working directly with children or seeking to improve their social and physical environments.

# The Henry Smith Charity

The Henry Smith Charity distributes over £28 million a year in grant programmes designed to reduce social and economic disadvantage in the UK.

Following a review of its grant procedures, the Funder has refined its Main Grant programmes, separating it into two defined funds under the same new strategy that aims to work with people for whom other sources of support have failed, been inappropriate or are simply not available.

This will be achieved through the following priorities:

- Increasing resilience - empowering people, encouraging integration and personal independence, helping people to recover and move on.
- Creating opportunities and life chances - raising aspiration, equipping people with new skills, unlocking and enabling potential, and providing the means to improve life circumstances.
- Empowering communities - strengthening and connecting communities and making people feel valued, providing opportunities for social connections and relationships, encouraging participation and inclusion.

The Charity's grants programmes now stand as follows:

- The Main Grants: Improving Lives Fund is the largest of the Charity's funds, and will support the work of established charitable organisations with incomes of up to £2 million. Funding is available for projects that help people when other sources of support have failed, are inappropriate, or are simply not available.
- The Main Grants: Strengthening Communities Fund is designed to support small charitable organisations working at grassroots level in the most disadvantaged areas of the UK.
- The Holiday Grants for Children programme provides grants for recreational trips and holidays for groups of children aged 13 and under in the UK who are disabled or disadvantaged. These are one-off short grants.
- The Christian Projects grant programme awards grants to projects that explicitly promote the Christian faith in the UK.

Grant sizes are generally between £10,000 and £60,000 and are for charities and not-for-profit organisations, including social enterprises that are based and working in the UK.

There are no deadlines. Applications are considered on a regular basis, depending on the fund applied to.
